
Two Iowa Daughters

Gangster in Our Midst (August 2017) By Betty Brandt Passick



The setting for **Gangster in Our Midst** is the late 1920s in Oxbow, Iowa (similar to Fairbank), a small bustling railroad village, populated with Germans, Scandinavians and Irish. Where Roman Catholics and Protestants lived clustered lives, separated by the Wapsipinicon River. A hamlet known for its Island Park, the

site of baptisms, picnics and amateur boxing matches. Prohibition overnight threw the whole nation into a tailspin. Chicago–260 miles southeast of Oxbow–quickly gained the reputation for its underworld jungle, but Oxbow grew its own crop of bootleggers. One day a 'mystery man' showed up on Oxbow's Main Street, and clinging to his arm was an area girl, Josephine. The town soon suspected him of being a gangster for Al Capone.

The idea for **Gangster in Our Midst** came from
interviews with former
school teachers, town council
members, and other resident
octogenarians as part of
research for a previous book.
Most mentioned stories of
the town's alleged gangster...
though ninety years later,



they still didn't know if he was really one of Al Capone's gangsters—or the story was merely folklore. This neglected Iowa story is told through FBI and police reports, newspaper accounts, and in the words of locals who knew the gangster best.

"Hattie" traveled throughout America and the world by horse and carriage, stage coach, train, steam ship and eventually motor car. She loved traveling but loved homecomings even

more.

The lives of Harriet's parents, brothers and sisters, and their families are also chronicled and woven within interpretive storytelling to create an entertaining and educational memorial to their legacy. The Ankenys were prominent and influential early Iowans. They



lived adventurous, interesting and successful lives as settlers, gold miners, civil war officers, entrepreneurs, elected officials, suffragettes, city founders and much more. Hundreds of Ankeny family artifacts (letters from Civil War battlefields, family bibles, rifles and swords, framed oil portraits, documents and more) stored within the State of Iowa Historical Archives were uncovered and used to tell their story. The book is a combination of storytelling, genealogy, and American history.

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
