Q & A

Q. *I'm interested in how you came to write the chapter with the long car ride to Chicago* ["Redemption and Grace"].

A. I have one especially great group of friends to whom I frequently sought ideas for writing or character development dilemmas involving *Gangster In Our Midst*.

As I neared completion of the final chapters, I still hadn't told a couple pieces of the story: **1.** What did people outside of the township know about Louie La Cava (from interviews with members of Oelwein's Italian community)? **2.** What might it have been like to accompany Louie on one of his day trips to Chicago (the town marshal made these trips, but so did other locals)?

A member of the aforementioned group suggested that LLC pick up a <u>hitchhiker</u> from the Oelwein area on his way to Chicago.

That idea stirred a memory from decades earlier, when I viewed a movie set in the Twin Cities: "<u>Patty Rocks</u>." That whole movie is about the conversation that takes place between two male friends during a car ride across the country lasting several days. With these pieces in mind, I began to write "Redemption and Grace." I set the year as 1961, just after the first Roman Catholic, J. F. Kennedy, was elected our 35th president—a continuance of the book's Catholic-Protestant war sub-theme.


The hitchhiker I created became a pretty teenage girl, Gracie. LLC quickly sees aspects of the young girl in his wife, Josephine, who too had run away from home in her teens. Is that the only reason he didn't kick Gracie out of the car (because of her unfiltered mouth)? And, perhaps you gained insights into why Al Capone might have kicked LLC out of Chicago in the early 1920s, with the threat of death if he returned! I found opportunities during this car ride to exploit and tie up several angles.
