

## Neither rain, nor snow, nor (flooding)...

Burlington, Iowa, like other towns along the mighty Mississippi River, has been dealing with <u>record flooding</u> this spring, but that did not deter this group (pictured) from coming to the **Burlington Public Library** the morning of May 3rd to hear about Fairbank, Iowa's gangster, Louie La Cava.

Lois Blythe, senior librarian with thirty years' experience, invited me to do an author talk in July 2018.

My remarks noted that "Scarface" Al Capone saw the 1919 ratification of the Eighteenth Amendment—banning the making, transporting, and sale of alcoholic beverages in the United States—as an opportunity to get rich. But so did a lot of others. Turf wars were inevitable, but Chicago was already bloodied from the 'Beer Wars'.

What propelled Capone to the top of the nation's Public Enemy list was the April 1926 triple murders that included Assistant State's Attorney for Cook County, Billy McSwiggin. It's believed Capone had put out the hit on two notorious rival gangsters that evening at a saloon on Roosevelt Road with whom Billy was keeping company. McSwiggin's murder was seen as an attack against the state. La Cava was among Capone's hitmen police brought in for questioning.

Then came the assassination of New York gangster, Frankie Yale, in July 1928, which might have initially passed as just another incidental skirmish between rival gangs who sought to control the illegal supply of alcohol and other activities—if not for the automatic revolver and sawed-off shotgun inside Yale's car police identified as belonging to Capone. The Feds really turned up the heat on Capone.

La Cava went into hiding—after two years, the Feds finally found him in Cleveland, Ohio and served him with a subpoena to testify as a tax witness against his old boss. In October 1931, Capone went off to the Atlanta Penitentiary for income tax evasion.

Was Louie La Cava destined to forever look over his shoulder?

Apparently so. When he built his house in Fairbank in the 1960s, he put a half-dozen deadbolts and locks on every door, a set of double locks on every window...and included a discreet place, a "panic room," of sorts, where two could hide for days at a time.
