Perhaps the most famous American author was Ernest Hemmingway, who criticized Fitzgerald for selling his scripts to Hollywood studios.



Fitzgerald 's first novel was a detective book; it proved to be a great success when finally published after three revisions as This Side of Paradise (we actually have several things in common).





## Victor would likely have been institutionalized

I have an adult autistic grandson. We first met when he was about five vears old. Around age six-

teen he began driving; graduated high school at eighteen; and holds a full-time job in Texas.

He's the reason I chose to tell Victor's saga in Gangster in our Midst.

Victor, a fictional character, is the eight year old son of Ed and Noritta Schumer, a farming family who lives outside the community of Oxbow (similar to Fairbank, Iowa, my hometown).

The reader first learns about Victor's infirmity on page 13:

The outbreaks of anger, screaming and thrashing started when Victor was about three. He'd been back and forth to doctors even taken him to the Mayo Clinic in Rochester, Minnesota. She believed her son wanted to communicate and got frustrated he couldn't speak. She read to him, treated him as she would have treated any other child. He was learning, she was certain.

The original theory behind such behavior was cold frigid mothers and bad parenting; the diagnosis: schizophrenic-labeled "idiot".

In 1938, Hans Asperger, a pediatrician at the University of Vienna, described numerous children he observed as autistic. He noted their spoken language limitations and emotional or social issues; also, that many exhibited a combination of skills and strengths of superior cognition-similar to his own childhood experience.

Today, this behavior is referred to as autism spectrum disorder (ASD).

Daughter-in-law, Adela Maurer, who will graduate in August with a PhD in Special Education, noted: "In the 1920s, a local physician would have reported a child presenting with ASD to the State of Iowa, and he or she would have been immediately institutionalized."

The reader gets a sense of Noritta's tenacity, in the fact that her son has remained at home, even attends the I.C. School, though his days are largely spent seated at an orphaned desk in the rear of the room, where he rocks in his seat.

Stimming is another symptom of ASD, which usually refers to specific behaviors that include hand-flapping, rocking, spinning, or repetition of words and phrases.
