## IHeartRadio Interview



# What happens to a gangster after he disappears from newspaper headlines?

By 1961, Louie La Cava, Oxbow's gangster, had largely retired from



gangstering. He left Manhattan in '48 and moved into a nice house in Vero Beach, Florida. Since--he, 73, and his wife, Josephine, 66, have been enjoying the 'good life'.

Two goals were the impetus in writing Ch. 27, "Grace and Redemption" (although I'm not sure how well I accomplished them by the numerous questions I've received).

I felt I needed to write about one of the Louie-Sweeney day trips to Chicago alluded to in the novel. I hoped the reader would assume this car trip began much like all the others—except in 1961, both men have grown old. Oxbow's Marshal Sweeney Delaney is eightytwo, and already asleep when Louie picks up the hitchhiker.

Goal #2: I wanted to continue the interrogation begun by Sweeney in Ch. 19, "The Duck Blind." Sweeney, while a good lawman, was also a friend to Louie, and he'd have kept his questions professional.

When I queried personal friends for ideas about how to 'put the screws to Louie' in this chapter, one suggested the hitchhiker.

Enter Gracie Failes. She's a pretty young thing, differential to Louie; also, modern and sophisticated, imprinted by the '50 women's rights issues.

She doesn't hold off very long after climbing into Louie's new Cadillac Deville before asking the first hard-hitting question (one his wife, Josephine, never even dared ask): "Lou, did you ever figure out why you became a gangster?..."

Then, just as unflinchingly, she goes for the \$64,000 question: "Whatcha gonna say to God to explain all the bad stuff you've done?..."

I interviewed Verlie (Hahn) Trower, born in 1916—one of the town kids who went to the Opera House to see movies with Louie in the '20s—and this was one of her comments about Louie (as she approached her one hundredth birthday):

(paraphrasing) Louie always had a kind of strut when he walked. One day when I saw him walking on the sidewalk near our house—after he and Josephine had built their house on the north end of town [1968]—I noticed he had a swagger... I thought it was because he knew he'd gotten by with doing a lot of bad stuff in his life.

Exactly what Louie sees when he stares in his rearview mirror, well, I leave up to the reader to decide.
