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



## The Murder of Phoebe Jane Vigoletti

Sensational gangster murders captured headlines of newspapers across America at the turn of the Twentieth Century.

Shadowy criminal organizations like the Black Hand gang, a group that had existed in Italy, used threats of violence and murder in an attempt to extort wealthy Italian-Americans.

A threatening letter and a coalblackened handprint was frequently

left on a victim's door, though symbols varied greatly in design.

Frankie Yale (also known as Francesco Ioele or Frankie Uale) was in his early twenties when he became Big Boss of the Italian colonies in Brooklyn and New York's east side, then director of the first Black Hand gang in America. In subsequent years, hundreds of Black Hand gangs, organized locally, sprung up throughout the country.

Even Oelwein, Iowa, with its major railroad hub and population of 7,000, had its share of activity by the Black Hand.

The community was one of three major settlements of Italians in Iowa, drawn by the rail yards and shops of the Chicago Great Western Railroad. By 1915, 500 Italians called Oelwein home, according to the Oelwein Chamber of Commerce.

In her book, Iowa Unsolved Murders: Historic Cases, Nancy Bowers cites two shocking murders attributed to the Black Hand in Oelwein.

Phoebe Jane Vigoletti, a 46-year-old Italian homemaker, was strangled in her home in 1926. Someone broke down the back door and strangled her with a rope. The kitchen showed signs of a violent struggle. Her body was removed from the house, taken across the back yard, hoisted over a fence, and dragged or carried a considerable distance, then dumped on the same site as that of an unnamed Italian male, who was stabbed 84 times in 1919.

Both murders have remained cold cases, a strong indicator of how much people feared retaliation by members of the Black Hand.

Murders like Vigoletti's fed the doctrine of Nativism in the United States—resulting in a widespread attitude that rejected alien persons, or culture, and led to xenophobia, the irrational fear of foreigners leading to racism and ethnic conflict—when all Italians became stereotyped as killers.

Americans pressured Legislators to bar them from coming into the country. The Immigration Act of 1924 effectively closed the 'Golden Door' to America to Italians—even though the vast majority of those immigrating were good, honest working people and not criminals.

I interviewed Italians from Oelwein as part of my research for Gangster in our Midst (2017). All were children when first hearing conversations among Italian adults about the Black Hand. "We're not gonna pay for protection!" one recalled his father had said. Eventually, the thugs were run out of town.
