## The Rigors of a Marriage (behind the scenes)

When I looked for places to encompass secondary mystery and intrigue in writing *The Black Bag of Dr. Wiltse, Murder on the Prairie* (2021), organic situations seemed to be in the relationship between Dr. Alexander Wiltse and his wife Phebe.

Wiltse family history is well documented. From church records I learned that Alex Wiltse and Phebe Wiltse shared the same surname when they married in 1844 in Johnstown, Canada West. They likely grew up in Wiltsetown, named after a shared ancestor who founded the village. At the time of their nuptials, Alex was twenty years old and Phebe about sixteen. Though marrying at such a young age was commonplace in the era, the practice carried certain built-in stresses and strains for a young couple.

Their first child Vidella arrived in 1849. Charles was born in 1850, and Edwin in 1851. The family of five immigrated from Canada to Colesburg, Iowa around 1854. Making such an arduous journey by sea and by land with three children under the age of five?

Dr. Wiltse quickly set about establishing himself as a physician; his clients were fellow immigrants, Indians, and prairie banditti. He spent long days attending to the sick and injured, crisscrossing the Iowa prairies and back slews of the Turkey River. In 1856 he found himself in the center of a heinous murder, then authorities seek him out to help solve mysterious deaths in the region. A couple years later the family relocated to Strawberry Point, where Phebe largely became the architect of building their future in America. Does she covertly resent that her husband is absent from home so much of the time?

In 1860 Phebe gave birth to her fourth child, Lucetta. Civil War in America broke out in 1861 — the same year twin daughters were born, Sophia and Annetta; Annetta died a day later. Any couple who has lost a child knows the agony of such a loss, even without the secret Alex carries.

The war lasts four long years. Alex is plagued with doubts about his dream of coming to America to make a better life for himself and his family. Phebe distrusts some of her decisions, as well.


