Back Story: "Wild Bill" Hickok (1837-1876)

I am pleased to announce my novella, **"A Thousand Miles from Boyhood,"** was chosen to be included in **Taking a Chance in Deadwood**, a Wild Deadwood Reads Anthology, published by Twisted Teacup Publishing, May 2024. The 515-page anthology is comprised of stories by ten authors in total.

"A Thousand Miles from Boyhood" tells the fictional story of "Wild Bill" Hickok, who in May 1876 departs for the goldfields of South Dakota, hoping to find the fortune that thus far had alluded him as gunslinger and gambler. Along the banks of Deadwood Creek, with the help of a young boy panning for gold, he discovers the kind of riches his mother, Polly Hickok, had spoken of a thousand miles from his boyhood home of LaSalle County, Illinois.

So, WHO was the real "Wild Bill" Hickok?

He was born James B. Hickok in Troy Grove, Illinois to William and Polly Hickok, child #4 of six children. Around age 18 (1855), he left home and took odd jobs to survive, when he began calling himself by his father's name, "Bill" Hickok (who had died three years earlier). He took part in the Kansas anti-slavery efforts in the years leading up to the Civil War, and during the war he served as a Union scout for General George A. Custer's 7th Cavalry.

Next, he became a driver of the Butterfield stage line, when he gained his initial fame as a 'gunfighter' for successfully defying the efforts of bandits who laid in wait to rob stages of the gold that carriers paid the line to transport.

In 1866, he became deputy United States marshal at Fort Riley, followed by marshal of Hays and Abilene, Kansas. His reputation as a marksman in desperate encounters with outlaws ultimately elevated him to a frontier legend. However, after Hickok shot and killed his own deputy in error, his career as a lawman came to a halt.

Several years thereafter he toured the East with Buffalo Bill Cody's Wild West Show. In 1876, at age 39, he married Agnes Lake Thatcher, of the Lake's Hippo Olympiad circus fame and fortune.

A month after his marriage to Agnes, he joined up with his old friend and leader of "Colorado Charlie" Utter's wagon train, and departed from Cheyenne, Wyoming for the goldfields of Deadwood, South Dakota, where he hoped to find his fortune, panning for gold and gambling. Less than three weeks after arriving in Deadwood, he was murdered at Nuttall & Mann's #10 Saloon.
